Without accurate, timely and complete information, exchange efforts will fail to deliver on the goal of providing usable information at key decision points in the justice process. This session will focus on the need to conduct data improvement efforts before implementing information exchanges and will provide an overview of proven techniques for improving information quality.</p>	<p><b>Session 3 -- Global Federated Identity Privilege Management (GFIPM) <u>John Wandelt, GTRI.</u></b>            The GFIPM framework provides justice agencies with a standards-based approach for implementing federated identity. GFIPM provides a standard set of XML elements and attributes about a federation user's identities, privileges, and authentication that provide identification/authentication, privilege management, and audit functions.</p>

8:45-10:00	<p><b>Session 15 – Responding to the Walsh Act – <u>Dustin Rhoads, JNET Business Manager</u></b></p> <p>The Walsh Act mandates classification of convicted sex offenders into three tiers, and requires Tier 3 offenders report their whereabouts every three months. The Act also orders creation of a national sex offender registry and requires states to maintain identical data elements that will make tracking sex offenders across state boundaries easier. This session will provide an update on state efforts to reengineer sex offender repositories to comply with the act.</p>	<p><b>Session 16 – NIEM, <i>Paul Wormeli, IJIS Institute</i></b></p> <p>The National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) is an XML-based information exchange methodology that evolved from the Global Justice XML Data Model (GJXDM). NIEM expands upon the GJXDM and is an outgrowth of a partnership of agencies from federal, tribal, state and local governments, as well as private industry. The intended outcome of NIEM is standards-based information sharing among all justice related agencies at all levels of government. This session will concentrate on the nuts and bolts of making NIEM work for key justice information exchanges.</p>

10:15-11:30	<p><b>Session 17 – Insider Threat and Security Breach Detection</b></p> <p><b><u>Peggy Bell, Executive Director, Delaware Criminal Justice Information System</u></b></p> <p>Delaware Criminal Justice Information Center (DELJIS) is statutorily responsible to track and assist in the investigation of any “alleged” breaches of the criminal justice system. Attend this session to learn more about the tools DELJIS has deployed to detect and investigate a breach real-time and receive email notifications of potential breaches. What used to take months to investigate now can be done in minutes. Not only is the tool useful for working on security breaches it is also extremely useful in the resolution of crime. Many times officers hear at a roll call a “vehicle on interest” and remember stopping or interacting with the same car a few days prior. Now DELJIS can assist the patrol officers in locating the stop quickly and with very little effort.</p>	<p><b>Session 18 – CONNECT – Interstate sharing efforts, <i>Gordon Lansford, KCJIS Director, KS; Tim Galante, Analysts International</i></b></p> <p>The CONNECT Project’s goal is to enable effective sharing of information among participating states. Alabama, Kansas, Nebraska, Tennessee and Wyoming, as founding members of CONNECT, are establishing a proof of concept capability to exchange information by extending their existing criminal justice information systems / portals within a pre-defined architecture leveraging proven national standards such as NIEM, JRA and GFIPM. Join us for a discussion of CONNECT’s vision and technical architecture – as well as the current status and lessons learned.</p>
